

Annual Business Meeting Minutes – January 8, 2025

Opening and Devotions: Church Chair Jerry Reimer called the meeting to order on Wednesday, January 8, 2025 at 7:00 p.m. with forty members present. The lamp was lit, symbolizing God's presence at the meeting. Justin Schardt led the group in devotions on "Fear, Faith, and Following Jesus".

Meeting Minutes: The minutes of the 2024 January 10 annual meeting are in the Annual Report and read at the meeting by Adm. Asst. Vicki Frerking. ▼Vern Jantzen moved to approve the minutes as presented; seconded by Dorothy Zimmerman and passed unanimously on a voice vote.

Deacons Report: Vicki Hinz-Ensz thanked the congregation for allowing her to serve. The Deacons appreciate the prayers, encouragement, and open communication they receive from the congregation. She is excited about the growth and scope of FMC in 2025 and beyond. FMC has many positive attributes including great pastoral leadership, members who willingly give of their time and talents, enthusiastic participation of the children and youth, and caring members with a long history of working as the church in service to God wherever He leads. She presented the Deacons Fund report, thanking the congregation for their support so they could once again help those in need in the community.

Deacon Election: The nominee for Deacon is Vicki Hinz-Ensz for her second 3-year term. Vicki was elected Deacon for the next three years unanimously on a ballot vote. Tallying votes were Brad Thimm and Neal Trantham.

Main Ballot: Nominating Committee Chair Sue Gerber presented the slate of nominees. ▼Dan Kunzman moved that those on the presented ballot be elected; seconded by Katie Jantzen and passed unanimously by voice vote.

Committee Reports: These are in the Annual Report. There were no questions or comments from the floor.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Josh referred to his report in the Annual Report and Jeremiah 6:16a. He feels he has settled into his role as Pastor of FMC and looks forward to listening and discerning God's paths in the future.

Associate Pastor's Report: Pastor Sarah referred to her report in the Annual Report and outlined her schedule as she returns from maternity leave. She will work 10-hour weeks through January and begin her regular 20 hours a week in February. She finds her work at FMC energizing and appreciates how FMC supports the youth.

Treasurer's Report: Mike Goossen presented the treasurer's report. There were no questions or comments.

2024-2025 Budget: Treasurer Mike Goossen presented the 2024-25 proposed budget of \$209,500. ▼Larry Thimm moved to approve the proposed budget; seconded by Vern Jantzen. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The Church Board presented a request for the congregation to authorize up to \$20,000 from the Undesignated Everence Funds to use only if needed, to meet the needs of the Faith Formation program, including the Assistant Pastor of Faith Formation's salary. ▼Mike Goossen moved to approve this request; seconded by Lori Thimm and passed unanimously.

Everence Report: FMC Everence Advocate Vern Jantzen explained the allocation process of the Everence Sharing Fund. Everence intended to allocate \$3000 to each church that applied but did not have enough funds, so FMC received \$2,394 in 2024 to add to the Deacon's Fund. Everence will disperse \$990,000 through their Sharing Fund in 2025. He will apply for FMC to receive a portion of that.

Adjournment: With no further business, Pastor Josh closed the meeting with prayer and Chair Reimer adjourned the meeting at 7:55 p.m. He extinguished the lamp; symbolizing God does not only stay in this place but goes with us into the world.

Beloved ones of First Mennonite Church,

As I look back on 2025, my heart echoes Paul's prayer in Ephesians—that we would be strengthened in our inner being, rooted and grounded in love, and increasingly aware of the vastness of Christ's presence among us. This past year has been filled with moments where that deep, immeasurable love has been made visible in our congregation: in the ways we show up for one another, in our worship and learning, and in our exploring what it means to love our neighbors with authenticity and depth. Again and again, I have seen God doing far more than all we could ask or imagine, shaping us into a people who embody the love of Christ together.

It is with deep gratitude and joy that I offer this annual report as we reflect on the journey God has led us through in 2025. Each year in the life of a congregation carries its own rhythm—its blessings, its challenges, its surprises, and its opportunities for faithfulness. As I reflect on the past twelve months, I am struck once again by the steady grace of God made visible in your lives, our communal worship, and our shared ministry.

We began the year with Cottage Prayer Meetings, gathering in small groups to reflect on listening, dwelling, and the deeper purpose of our Shepherd Groups. These conversations invited us to slow down, to be attentive to God's presence, and to ask what it means to walk alongside one another in meaningful, sustaining ways. These early-year gatherings helped set a tone of spiritual attentiveness that carried into our worship and life together.

Our worship this year was shaped by two major sermon series. During the summer, we engaged a Women of the Bible series, exploring the stories and courage of women who shaped God's people in profound ways. Their witness invited us to examine our own faith with fresh eyes. In the fall, we turned to the Beatitudes in a series titled "Backwards Blessings." Each week included a spiritual practice—lament journaling, simplicity, mercy, peacemaking, and more—inviting us not only to hear Jesus' teachings but to embody them. Your willingness to try these practices, even the uncomfortable ones, is a testament to the depth of your faith and your desire to grow. In all of this, I have seen the love of Christ at work—strengthening our inner being, grounding us in faith, and inspiring us to live into God's abundant purposes.

One of our great joys this year was covenanting as a congregation alongside Pastor Sarah and John as they dedicated Ivan to God on November 16. Moments like these remind us of God's faithfulness from generation to generation and the sacred trust we share in nurturing the next generation of disciples.

Throughout the year, I continued to explore how the Beatrice Ministerial Association can best engage pastors and our wider community. These ongoing conversations are helping us discern fresh ways to support one

another, respond to community needs, and build bridges across denominational lines. I am grateful for the openness and collaborative spirit that these efforts continue to foster.

This summer I also had the opportunity to connect and learn at the MCUSA Convention. These times of training, worship, and fellowship broaden my understanding of the wider church and renew my own commitment to serving faithfully here at FMC. I am grateful for the support that allows me to participate in such gatherings.

On a personal note, our family celebrated the birth of our daughter Dorothea in November. Your prayers, meals, gifts, and encouragement have meant the world to us. Thank you for surrounding us with such love during this joyful season!

Of course, this year has not been without its challenges. The weight of the world's struggles—violence, division, uncertainty—has often touched our hearts and our spirits. And yet, even in this, I have witnessed the quiet resilience of this congregation: the way you show up for one another, the way you pray for our neighbors, the way you tend to the ordinary work of love. Through it all, I am reminded of Paul's words that we are being strengthened in our inner being, rooted and grounded in love, and empowered to comprehend the breadth and length and height and depth of Christ's love—a love that endures and carries us forward.

As I look back on this year, what I am most grateful for is the relationships, community, and fellowship we share. Joy truly abound, sometimes quietly, sometimes boldly, always as a gift of God. I have seen Christ Jesus in your kindness, your humor, your generosity, your honesty, your faith. I have seen God's abundant work within us, shaping us for the future in ways that exceed all we could ask or imagine.

As we step into the coming year, I believe we will continue to be shaped by the joy and love that define our life together. We are called to keep learning how to love our neighbors and our community with authenticity, depth, and mutuality. God has planted us here for a reason, and I trust that the Spirit will continue to guide us into the kind of relationships that bear witness to Christ's reconciling love.

Thank you for the privilege of continuing to serve as your pastor. Thank you for your trust, your prayers, and your partnership in the gospel. I am honored to walk this road with you.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR OF FAITH FORMATION

As I reflect on this past year and on our community, I find myself returning to Deuteronomy 6:5–7. We are instructed to love the Lord our God with all our heart, our being, and our strength. Jesus adds, to love our neighbor as ourselves. These words are meant to stay with us: on our minds, on our lips, shaping our conversations with our children, guiding us at home and out in the world.

Our church mission ends with a call to “carry the good news,” and I am reminded that this includes how we show up each day. Our children are watching. We pass on faith not only through programs and teaching, but also through the examples we set and the ways we interact with them.

I am deeply grateful for the value this community places on nurturing the faith of our youngest congregants (we have 36 children and youth, from birth through college!) and for the trust you place in me to oversee the ministry of faith formation at First Mennonite. Below is a summary of the work I have done this year alongside and because of you, the congregation.

Youth Ministry

- With my position at half-time, my primary focus this year continued to be youth ministry.
- **Wednesday Nights:** JYF and SYF now meet separately. Classrooms were updated: SYF received donated couches, and the room across from the women’s restroom was repainted for JYF. A new monthly rotation of themes was implemented on Wednesday nights: *exploring faith, building relationships, and serving together*. I am grateful to Marcia Regier and Darcy Esau for sharing leadership each week.
- **Baptism Class:** Seven youth began baptism classes this fall, with baptisms planned for spring.
- **Service:** Both JYF and SYF served at Warren’s Table in October.
- **Fundraisers:** A spring pancake feed and a fall soup lunch was held this year. Thank you for your continued generosity supporting youth ministries.
- **JYF:** There are eight enthusiastic youth. In February, four youth and three adults attended “Know Jesus” at Hesston College.
- **SYF:** Has five thoughtful youth. This summer, two youth joined with two congregations to attend MC USA’s convention in Greensboro, NC.
- **Sunday School:** Continued using the *Spirit & Life* narrative lectionary curriculum. I am thankful for our excellent teachers: Lynn Gerber, Paula Heinz, and Grace Tegtmeier.

Children’s Ministry

- **Sunday School:** Continued use of the Shine curriculum. Grateful for the dedication and care of our teachers.
- **VBS:** Supported the VBS committee by organizing the dramas and leading a song-and-story time with Grace Tegtmeier.

Family Ministry

- Created Lent and Advent resource kits for families.
- Distributed a spring survey to families about faith formation programming; results helped the Education Council plan for the fall.
- Assisted Shana Enszt and Amanda Thimm in planning the Young Adult Retreat (March 22–23), with 28 registrants. Jeff King served as guest speaker, teaching on the Enneagram.

Safe Church

- The Safe Church Committee (formally the Safe Sanctuary Committee) engaged the growing body of research and denominational guidance on creating safe and accountable church spaces.
- As a result a review of First Mennonite's Abuse Prevention Policy began with Debbie Goossen, Neal Trantham, and Grace Tegtmeier.
- We have worked to integrate the updated MC USA guidelines, industry best practices, and procedures for supporting anyone who has experienced abuse.
- Our goal is to finish editing and implement the updated policy in the coming year.

Service to Western District Conference

- Served as Bible instructor for a week at Camp Mennoscah.
- Helped organize and will co-lead an online WDC-wide book study in the new year on *Woven* by Meredith Miller.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

"Waves of Wonder" was the theme for this year's Bible School at FMC, May 27-30, 2025, from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. We learned of various ways God uses water throughout the Bible. We couldn't do VBS without the wonderful staff of 29 volunteers. We had 33 students participating this year. Thank you to Zella Penner for her decorating expertise, we had coral reefs, water on the ceiling and a sail boat naming the different sessions. The VBS committee of Lori Thimm, Linsey Schardt and Laura Williamson scheduled the dates, sent out invitations to invite the children to attend, scheduled the volunteers, helped decorate and undecorate.

Students were divided up into four groups: Preschool & Kindergarten, Grades 1 & 2, Grade 3 and Grades 4 & 5. Thank you to Shana Ensz for leading all students in the opening session with music and learning the memory verse. Thank you to Pastor Josh and Pastor Sarah for leading the Bible story in a drama and involving various youth in the dramas. Pastor Josh also challenged us to raise 1,000 diapers and 25 packages of wipes for the Mother To Mother diaper bank, and then he would eat gross seafood. Groups then rotated between sessions of Bible Beach, Creators Coast, Music Harbor and Seaside Games. The cookie ladies did a wonder job of having some fun snacks that followed the Waves of Wonder theme and were enjoyed by all the students in the fellowship hall.

Our skating party was held after VBS on Friday, VBS staff transported the students to the Rolla Rena. Thank you to Marv & Lisa Goossen for providing the pizza for lunch at the Rolla Rena. Parents picked up their kids at 2:00.

The VBS program was held Sunday, June 1, 2025 at 10:30 a.m. Students performed songs, did 3 of the dramas from the week. A slide show shared the events, fun and learning of the week.

Our offering community project was the diaper bank at Mother to Mother in Beatrice. We exceeded our goal and raised 2,678 diapers and 66 packages of wipes, which led to Pastor Josh eating, octopus, sardine sundae, chub mackerel, and a seafood smoothie of oysters, anchovies and clams. We also challenged the congregation to raising \$3,000 for the diaper bank and then the kids would get a water balloon fight and get to dump buckets of water on Pastor Josh's head. We raised \$3,504! A huge THANK YOU to all that helped us provide diapers and wipes for many families in Beatrice.

What a great week we had! It is our prayer that VBS makes a difference in the lives of the children who attend. The continued support of our church family makes this week possible. The committee thanks you!!

The Executive Committee also serves as the Kitchen Committee. They clean the kitchen at church cleaning, help serve food at the evening cleaning, and prepare and serve Semmel for the morning cleaning. This year church cleaning was March 20 & 21. Thursday evening 15 people came and Friday morning 21 came to clean.

We also sent 19 comforters to the Beatrice Community Hospital to be given to End of Life patients. We also completed a beautiful quilt which was sold at the MCC Sale. Alma Reimer also made some cloth star ornaments that we helped her finish. These were made at the request of Pastor Sarah that she will use for a children's story.

Our Annual Meeting was held after lunch at our regular WMS meeting on November 26. Our recommendations for distribution of our money, pending approval of our members, are as follows: \$200 for the Stutzman's Christmas present - \$200 for Pastor Josh's Christmas present - \$100 for Pastor Sarah's Christmas present; \$400 to MDS; \$400 to Mother to Mother; \$400 to the Community Food Pantry; \$400 to Sewing for Babies; \$600 to Camp Mennoscah.

The Christmas Brunch was held on December 7, with Grace Tegtmeier as our guest speaker. She told the inspiring story of how she and Chris came to adopt their 3 children, Hannah, Tony, and Samantha. The offering went for Western District Women.
